

Conditions of Sale

The property described in this catalogue will be offered at public auction by Robert A. Siegel Auction Galleries, Inc. ("Galleries") on behalf of various consignors and itself or affiliated companies. By bidding on any lot, whether directly or by or through an agent, in person, or by telephone, facsimile or any other means, the bidder acknowledges and agrees to all of the following Conditions of Sale.

1. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. The term "final bid" means the last bid acknowledged by the auctioneer, which is normally the highest bid offered. The purchase price payable by the buyer will be the sum of the final bid and a commission of 10% of the final bid ("buyer's premium"), together with any sales tax or use tax which may be due on the sale.

2. The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid, to advance the bidding at his discretion and, in the event of a dispute between bidders, to determine the successful bidder, to continue the bidding or to reoffer and resell the lot in dispute. The Galleries' record of the final sale shall be conclusive.

3. All bids are per numbered lot in the catalogue unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to group two or more lots, to withdraw any lot or lots from the sale, or to act on behalf of the seller. The Galleries will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for any errors in the execution of such bids.

4. Lot numbers followed by the symbol ° are offered subject to one or more of the following conditions: (i) the lot is subject to a minimum final bid ("reserve"), below which it will not be sold, (ii) the Galleries have advanced monies to the seller and have a financial interest in the lot, (iii) the Galleries have guaranteed the seller a minimum sale price, and (iv) the Galleries may have ownership interest in the lot, either in part or whole. The absence of the symbol ° means that the lot is offered without reserve.

5. Any lot, the description of which is obviously incorrect, is returnable, but only if the lot is returned within 14 days of receipt. All disputed lots must be returned intact with the original packing material. The following lots may not be returned for any reason: Lots containing ten or more items; lots from buyers who have registered for the pre-sale exhibition or received lots by postal viewing, thereby having had the opportunity to inspect them before the sale; any lot described with "faults" or "defects" may not be returned because of any fault or defect. No illustrated lots may be returned because of centering, margins or other factors shown in the illusrations.

6. Successful bidders, unless they have established credit with the Galleries prior to the sale, must make payment in full before the lots will be delivered. Buyers not known to the Galleries must make payment in full within three days from the date of sale. The Galleries retain the right to demand payment at the time the lot is knocked down to the highest bidder, for any reason whatsoever. In the event that any buyer refuses or fails to make payment in the auctioneer reserves the right to reoffer the lot immediately for sale to the highest bidder.

7. If the purchase price has not been paid within the time limit specified above, nor lots taken up within seven days from the date of sale, the lots will be resold by whatever means deemed appropri-

ate by the Galleries, and any loss incurred from resale will be charged to the defaulting buyer. Any account more than thirty days in arrears will be subject to a late payment charge of 1½% per month as long as the account remains in arrears. Any expenses incurred in securing payment from delinquent accounts will be charged to the defaulter.

8. All lots are sold as genuine. Any lot which is accompanied by an expert certificate (for U.S. items, the accepted authority is The Philatelic Foundation), dated within the past five years of the sale date, is sold "as is" and in accordance with the description on the certificate. Such lots may not be returned for any reason, including but not limited to a contrary certificate of opinion obtained after the sale. Buyers who wish to obtain a certificate for any item that is not accompanied by a certificate dated within the past five years may do so, provided that the following conditions are met: (1) the purchase price must be paid in full, (2) the item must be submitted to an acceptable expertizing committee with a properly executed application form within 21 days of the sale, (3) a copy of the application form must be given to the Galleries, (4) in the event that an adverse opinion is received, the Galleries retain the right to resubmit the item on the buyer's behalf for reconsideration, without time limit or other restrictions, (5) unless written notification to the contrary is received, items submitted for certification will be considered cleared 90 days from the date of sale, and (6) in the event any item is determined to be "not as described", the buyer will be refunded the purchase price, plus interest accrued on the purchase price at the prevailing Treasury Bill Rate from the date of payment, and the certification fee up to \$100.00 unless otherwise agreed.

9. Until paid for in full, all lots remain the property of the Galleries on behalf of the seller.

10. Agents executing bids on behalf of clients will be held responsible for all purchases made on behalf of clients unless otherwise arranged prior to the sale.

11. The buyer assumes all risk for delivery of purchased lots, and agrees to pay for all out-of-pocket costs incurred in shipping. 12. The bidder consents that any action or proceeding against it may be commenced and maintained in any court within the State of New York or in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, that the courts of the State of New York and United States District Court for the Southern District of New York shall have jurisdiction with respect to the subject matter hereof and the person of the bidder. The bidder agrees not to assert any defense to any action or proceeding initiated by Galleries based upon improper venue or inconvenient forum. The bidder agrees that any action brought by the bidder shall be commenced and maintained only in a Federal Court in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York or the State Court in the county in which Galleries has its principal place of business in New York. These Terms and Conditions shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the substantive laws of the State of New York.

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Grading Terms, Abbreviations and Values Used in Descriptions

Centering and Gum

Margin width, centering and gum are graded according to Scott Catalogue standards.

Extremely Fine (EF): Exceptionally large margins or near perfect centering. The term "Gem" describes condition that is the finest possible for the issue.

Very Fine (VF): Normal size margins for the issue and well-centered with the design a bit closer to one side.

Fine (F): Smaller than usual margins or noticeably off center. Pre-1890 issues may have the design touched in places.

Very Good (VG): Attractive appearance, but margins or perforations cut into the design.

Good (G) or Average (Ave.): Cut into or perfs far into design and usually with slight faults. This condition is generally acceptable for rarities, scarce multiples or stamps used on unusual covers.

Covers

Minor nicks, short edge tears, flap tears and slight reduction at one side are normal conditions for 19th century envelopes. Folded letters should be expected to have at least one file fold. Light cleaning of covers and small mends along the edges are accepted forms of conservation. Unusual covers may have a common stamp with a slight crease or tiny tear. **These flaws exist in virtually all 19th century covers and are not always described. They are not grounds for return.**

Catalogue Values and Estimates

Unless otherwise noted, the currently available *Scott Catalogue* values are quoted in dollars with a decimal point. Other catalogues are often used for foreign countries or specialized areas and are referred to by their common name: *Stanley Gibbons* (SG), *Dietz, American Air Mail Catalogue* (AAMC), *Michel, Zumstein, Facit*, etc. Estimates are indicated with an "E." and reflect our conservative valuation in dollars. Reserves will never exceed the low end of the estimate range; they will sometimes exceed Scott Catalogue value for stamps in Extremely Fine condition.

Because of certain pricing inconsistencies in the Scott Catalogue—for example, blocks that have no gum, the absence of premiums for Mint N.H. items, etc.—we cannot guarantee the accuracy of values quoted for multiples, specialized items and collection lots. We generally try to be conservative, but buyers may not return a lot because of a discrepancy in catalogue value due to Scott pricing inconsistencies.

THE HORRIFIC WAR BETWEEN THE STATES has been studied, analysed, researched and reenacted more than any other war in history. Thousands of books have been written on the subject. The television series by Ken Burns was a huge success. Numerous historical societies are devoted to the subject. And a search for Civil War topics on the World Wide Web will produce hundreds of sites.

While Civil War postal history has also enjoyed huge popularity, and our firm features two major Civil War auctions each year, we still feel that the stamps of the Confederate States are not fully appreciated by collectors nor adequately supplied and advocated by dealers.

The Confederate era of philately begins on December 20, 1860, and effectively ends in May 1865, although covers related to the conflict can be found before and after that time frame. In just under six years the Confederate government produced an incredibly wide range of proofs, stamps, postal markings and unusual covers, which reflect the extraordinary circumstances of the time. We dare say that Confederate philately has more to offer philatelists than most classic countries of the world.

Despite this diversity and depth, the contingent of serious Confederate collectors is relatively small, and, in our opinion, much of the material is not fully understood or appreciated. We applaud the efforts of those who have worked hard to disseminate information about Confederate philately – in particular, the leadership of the Confederate Stamp Alliance over many years, the collectors who exhibit for the benefit of the public, and the authors who educate us – but we must also lament the indifference of many collectors and dealers who understand so little about the stamps and postal history of the thirteen states and other territory in the Confederate domain.

In our effort to introduce collectors to Confederate philately, we sometimes feel like a soap-box preacher shouting to pedestrians. How can we convey our excitement and fascination? Which of the many examples should we show? Try these for starters:

- Covers dated on the secession date for each state
- Confederate use of demonetized stamps marked "Southern Letter Unpaid"
- Express covers carried across the lines
- The first bi-colored postage stamps in the Western hemisphere
- Postmasters' provisionals (several unique)
- Unique models and essays proposed for the new Confederate stamp contract
- Robert E. Lee signed field covers
- Lithographed issues with rare blocks, plate and shade varieties that few people even know how to identify (a rich field for study)
- Extraordinary shades of the 10c Rose Lithograph
- Bisected stamps
- Patriotic, College and Advertising covers
- Wallpaper and turned envelopes

- Railroad and steamboat mail
- Army field office markings
- Confederate occupation of New Mexico and Indian Territory
- Special routes through the Atlantic blockade, across the Mississippi River and over the Mexican border
- Mail smuggled out of Union-occupied New Orleans
- Prisoners' mail (many with mixed frankings)

The material speaks for itself, but a market can only grow through the work of reputable and dedicated professionals. For years the veteran Boston dealer who specializes in Confederates, Jack E. Molesworth, has run an advertisement under the banner "Does your collection contain...", followed by a list comparable to ours in the preceding paragraph. Mr. Molesworth is one of the few professionals today who stock Confederates and actively service collectors in the area. The firm of Raymond and Roger Weill has been perhaps the longest and most ardent supporter of Confederate philately, building some of the greatest collections ever formed. Another professional who likes owning Confederates more than selling them is John Birkinbine II. David G. Phillips, our auction colleague, has generously devoted time and effort to publishing the Dietz catalogue and other Confederate books. We should also mention the efforts of dealers no longer with us - William G. Bogg, John Kaufmann and, of course, our firm's founder, Robert A. Siegel.

Now is the time for all good philatelists to start collecting Confederates. This sale is 1,500 lots in size, \$1.5 million in value and the catalogue is 400 pages in length. That is roughly ten to fifteen times the size of an advanced Confederate collection. It is about three times the size of the great Morris Everett collection we sold in 1993. Such size and quality make this sale, in our opinion, the most important Confederate auction since the Caspary sale forty years ago.

Because of the extraordinary wealth of material we have to offer, this catalogue has been created as a reference book. It is slightly larger than our standard catalogue and has significantly more color photography than usual (with pictures on each page near the text). The printing bill will probably be one-third of our annual printing expenses. This investment reflects our enthusiasm and commitment, as well as our determination to use this catalogue to attract new collectors now and in the future.

Auctioneers often speak of a "one-owner sale", assigning special significance to the collection. In this case, we have a "four-owner sale", and each gentleman deserves recognition for building a world-class collection. They are John Birkinbine II (this sale offers a portion of the collection), Alexander Hall, William F. Murphy and Sherrell Nunnelley. The list on pages 406-407 identifies lots by name (excluding other consignors' lots).

As a final note, we gratefully acknowledge the assistance of John Birkinbine II and Brian Green in the preparation of this catalogue. Mr. Birkinbine's research is shown in the table of secession dates on page iv and reflected in the descriptions. The always-helpful Mr. Green was willing to answer numerous questions about Confederate postal history.

Very few examples of this Davis-Stephens 10-Star Confederate Flag patriotic design are known. The tenth star represents North Carolina, which seceded on May 20th and was admitted to the Confederate States on May 27th. The eleventh star with "T" on the song sheet represents Tennessee, which was admitted as a Confederate State on May 16th, subject to the ratification election on June 24th (ordinance of secession May 6th, popular vote June 8th, ratification June 24th).

The absence of a rate marking is another unusual and interesting feature. A cover is known from Corinth postmarked June 1st, the first day of the Confederate postal system, with a "Paid" and "3" cent rate crossed out and re-rated "5". Our theory regarding the absence of a rate marking is that the Corinth postmaster anticipated the June 1st change but was uncertain whether or not mail prepaid at the U.S. 3c rate should be marked as such E. 5,000-7,500

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, By the provisions of an act, approved March 15th, 1861, and amended by the first section of an act approved May 9th, 1861, the Post-Master General of the Confederate States "is authorized, on and after a day to be named by him for that purpose, to take the entire charge and direction of the postal service in the Confederate States," and all conveyance of mails within their limits, from and after such day, except by authority of the Post-Master General thereof, is thereby prohibited:

Now, therefore, I, John H. Reagan, Post-Master General of the Confederate States of America, do issue this my proclamation, notifying all Post-Masters, Contractors, and Special and Route Agents, in the service of the Post-Office Department, and engaged in the transmission and delivery of the mails, or otherwise in any manner connected with the service within the limits of the Confederate States of America, that on and after the 1st day June next, I shall assume the entire control and direction of the postal service therein : And I hereby direct all Post-Masters, Route Agents and Special Agents within these States, and now acting under the authority and direction of the Post-Master General of the United States, to continue in the discharge of their respective duties under the authority vested in me by the Congress of the Confederate States, in strict conformity with such existing laws and regulations as are not inconsistent with the laws and constitution of the Confederate States of America, and such further instructious as may hereafter be issued by my direction : And the said Post-Masters, Route Agents and Special Agents are also required to forward to this Department, without delay, their names, with the names of the offices of which they are Post-Masters, (giving the State and County,) to be directed to the "Chief of the Appointment Bureau, Post-Office Department, Montgomery, Alabama," in order that new commissions may be issued under the authority of this Government : And all Post-Masters are hereby required to render to the Post-Office Department at Washington, D. C., their final accounts and their vouchers for postal receipts and expenditures, up to the 31st day of this month, taking care to forward with said accounts all postage stamps and stamped envelopes, remaining on 1 and, belonging to the Post-Office Department of the United States, in order that they may receive the proper credits therefor in the adjustment of their accounts; and they are further required to retain in their possession, to meet the orders of the Post-Master General of the United States, for the payment of mail service within the Confederate States, all revenue which shall have accrued from the postal service prior to the said 1st day of June next.

All Contractors, Mail Messengers, and Special Contractors for conveying the mails within the Confederate States, under existing contracts with the Government of the United States, are hereby authorized to continue to perform such service under my direction, from and after the day last above named, subject to such modifications and changes as may be found necessary, under the powers vested in the Post-Master General by the terms of said contracts and the provisions of the second section of an act approved May-9th, 1861, conformable thereto: And the said Contractors Special Contractors, and Mail Messengers, are required to forward, without delay, the number of their route or routes, the nature of the service thereon, the schedules of arrivals and departures, the names of the offices supplied, and the amount of annual compensation for present service, together with their address, directed to the "Chief of the Contract Bureau, Post-Office Department, Montgomery, Alabama.

Until a postal treaty shall be made with the Government of the United States for the exchange of mails between that Government and the Government of this Confederacy, Pest-Masters will not be authorized to collect United States postage on mail matter sent to or received from those States; and until supplies of postage stamps and stamped envelopes are procured for the pre-payment of postage within the Confederate States, all postages must be paid in money, under the provisions of the first section of an act approved March 1st, 1861.







Mail originating in the South between June 1st and August 26th was allowed to cross the lines via Louisville—any prepayment was ignored, thus the purpose of the "Southern Letter Unpaid" marking. However, mail addressed from the North to any of the Confederate States was intercepted and sent to the Dead Letter Office. Examples of such letters are rare, and this is the only one we have located that originated in the border state of Kentucky.

The sender, a self-described "Widowed Mother", was evidently not familiar with the procedure for locating Union soldiers taken prisoner by the Confederates. Rather than follow the formal civilian "Flag of Truce" mail procedure, she simply addressed her letter to Brigadier General Winder at Richmond. Fox, some of which have never been properly identified (these fakes bear the David Cleage address, a known correspondence). Perhaps the rarity of the Knoxville oval is appreciated less because of the circulating fakes.

The original letter is enclosed. Datelined "Harrisburg, Aug. 12th, 1861" (presumably in Pennsylvania), it is a brief but fascinating inquiry, "Please let me know if you think the money I have invested in Mobile is safe? Will interest money be paid? There is a colored man in Mobile, belonging to Mr. William Redwood—could you manage to find out if Mr. Redwood would sell him \mathfrak{S} on what terms, without letting him know by whose promptings you made the enquiry? The man's name is Jim Bragg, his wife belonged to me, \mathfrak{S} is now with me. I see no immediate prospects for the close of this unhappy war. I fear both parties must fight it out, until one or other is compelled to succumb." This pragmatic businessman was rightfully concerned about the security of his Southern investment, was attempting to purchase the freedom of a slave and reunite him with his wife, and correctly predicted the course of the war.

Six days after this cover and letter entered the mails in Nashville, the Federal order closing down the express operations went into effect, and on August 30th the messenger for American Letter Express Co. was arrested upon arrival in Louisville. The cover has been torn in half down the center and thru the 3c pair. In addition, much of the bottom stamp of the 3c pair was torn off, apparently to reveal the "10" rate handstamp. For the purpose of improving its appearance, archival tape has been used to seal the tear, and the back of the cover bearing the Harndens label has been folded up for display. Considering that this extraordinary express cover is the only recorded example of its kind, collectors are advised to overlook the condition factors.

Adams Express Company retained the Harnden name at certain offices in Georgia, because of the Harnden firm's reputation there. The Harnden oval handstamps used at Macon and Savannah are very rare. This cover was evidently sent by Adams (Harnden) messenger from Americus, Georgia, to the office at Louisville. As required by regulations, Confederate postage was prepaid, but in this unusual instance the Confederate post office at the originating point applied its town marking. The Adams office at Louisville correctly applied new stamps—it is not clear why the letter was re-rated 6c rather than 3c—and they put it into the regular Federal mails for New York City...... > This Palmetto Tree design is unique among Confederate postmasters' provisionals, although the symbol was also used on the unissued 10c adhesive stamp prepared for the Charleston postmaster, Alfred Huger. On this entire—the sole surviving example—the woodcut is printed in a dark blue identical in shade and consistency to the 5c woodcut provisional issued in 1861. The circular datestamp is struck at the center of the upper half of the entire, a position consistent with virtually all recorded genuine examples of the earlier 5c entire. Charleston did not have a separate cancelling device and used the datestamp to cancel adhesive stamps; therefore, the position of the datestamp on this entire confirms the presence of the printed provisional at upper right and precludes any possibility that an adhesive was removed.

The first provisionals used in Charleston were the press-printed 5c envelopes issued in August 1861 (eku Aug. 16) and used consistently until the estimated 5,000 prepared were sold out in November 1861 (lku Nov. 12). Approximately 25,000 5c adhesive stamps were produced and placed on sale as early as September 1861 (eku Sep. 4). Both provisionals were used concurrently with the handstamped "Paid" markings, but the surcharge on the price of provisionals made these less popular with the public. When Confederate General Issues were finally received and put on sale at the Charleston post office on December 7, 1861, the large number of 5c provisionals still on hand was withdrawn, although letters franked with the provisionals were still accepted as prepaid.

In June 1862 the supply of 5c General Issues available at the Charleston post office was evidently diminished, and Postmaster Huger authorized the renewed sale of provisional adhesive stamps. More than a dozen examples of the 5c provisional stamp are known used in the months of June, July and August 1862. The handstamped "Paid" marking was also used again briefly in June 1862 after having been previously retired in December 1861.


The rate increase from 5c to 10c for any distance became effective July 1, 1862, during the shortage of General Issues. Charleston covers are recorded in early July 1862 with the 5c Blue Lithograph (Scott 4) or 10c Rose Lithograph stamps, but these are scarce, indicating that only a small supply of the newer General Issues was available. Further evidence of the shortage is an August 5th cover with a combination of the 5c De La Rue stamp and 5c provisional for the 10c rate.

The press-printed entire must be viewed in the context of the above-outlined events and circumstances. It was almost certainly issued in anticipation of the July 1862 rate change and in response to the shortage of General Issues. The 10c press-printed entire's great rarity is probably due to the arrival of 10c Rose Lithograph stamps in July 1862, which are found on covers dated July 3, 4, 5 and continuing on with frequency until replaced by the De La Rue and Richmond 5c printings. The total absence of unused 10c entires from the original printing is consistent with other Charleston provisionals, which were probably destroyed when the post office was moved in August 1863, following the shelling of Charleston by Union forces on Morris Island.


This unique example of the 10c Palmetto Tree entire was discovered by the late Dr. Don Preston Peters of Lynchburg, Virginia, in an original correspondence to A. O. Norris at Anderson Court House, South Carolina. Two pre-war covers from Pendleton and Greenville C.H., South Carolina, together with Dr. Peters' original notes, are included in this lot. The cover was offered in the 1949 auction of the Peters collection, at which time it was not listed in the Scott Catalogue. A letter from Stanley B. Ashbrook, dated November 19, 1949, is also included and affirms Ashbrook's opinion that the unique entire is genuine.

We regard this entire as one of the most important and distinctive of all Confederate postmasters' provisionals, by virtue of its extreme rarity, its Palmetto Tree design, and as one of the few 10c provisionals issued east of the Mississippi after the July 1862 rate change. There are sixteen unique Confederate postmasters' provisional adhesives (A) or press-printed entires (E); the others are from Austin Miss. (E), Beaumont Tex. (A—large 10c type), Bridgeville Ala. (A—pair), Fincastle Va. (E), Franklin N.C. (E), Hallettsville Tex. (A), Hillsboro N.C. (A), Jetersville Va. (A—pair), Kingston Tenn. (E), Knoxville Tenn. (A—10c), Mt. Lebanon La. (A), New Smyrna Fla. (A), Port Lavaca Tex. (A), Rutherfordton N.C. (A) and Salisbury N.C. (E—damaged).







The Emory postmaster, I. C. Fowler, created his provisional issue by stamping his "Paid" and "5" rate markings on the blank selvage of demonetized United States 1c 1857 Issue sheets. This method is unique among Confederate provisionals and, in all of philately, there are few issues created from sheet selvage. The Philadelphia carrier stamps made from the selvage of imperforate 1c 1851 sheets are similar in concept to the Emory provisionals.

The plate number captured on this example is in the selvage adjacent to Position 51 in the left pane of plate 8. Plate number blocks from this plate are very scarce—an unused imprint and plate number block of eight is included in this lot (heavily thinned).

In our opinion this is the finest of the nine recorded Emory provisional covers. Ex Caspary and Freeland. The plate number single on cover is not listed in Scott..... E. 15,000-20,000





The stamps prepared by Greenville postmaster, Judge B. F. Porter, are remarkable not only for their rarity, but even more so as one of two Confederate provisionals printed in two colors—the other being the Baton Rouge 5c in green and carmine. These are the first government-issued, bi-colored adhesive postage stamps to appear anywhere in the Western Hemisphere, and, as such, they deserve special recognition by philatelists.

After a thorough search of relevant records (auction sales, Levi clippings, Philatelic Foundation and Confederate Stamp Alliance certificates) we have located only eight examples of either Greenville denomination, including four off-cover 5c stamps (all uncancelled and Type I), two 5c covers (both Type I), and two 10c covers (both Type II). Curiously, there is no genuine 5c Type II (Scott 33X1a) in any of the sources consulted, but there is an illustration of a 5c Type II in the 1929 Dietz book (p. 47), which is a reputed counterfeit—the 10c Type I in the same photo is counterfeit and is thought to have come from a group offered in the Ferrary sale. Based on the evidence we have seen, it is our opinion that the 5c exists only as Type I with Roman letters, and the 10c only as Type II with italics. The Scott listing for 33X1a is in question until a genuine 5c Type II stamp is found.

On the subject of value, we wish to note that the Birkinbine collection, from which this unused stamp comes, contained one of the two recorded 5c covers, which was sold privately to a collector for a price significantly higher than the \$18,000 1997 Scott value. The \$4,500 Scott value for an unused 5c has not been changed in thirteen years and should not be considered a reliable guide to current market value.







Two of the five recorded Adams Express covers with the 5c Nashville are from the Knowles correspondence to Rhode Island. One of the five is a North-to-South usage with the provisional paying postage from Nashville to Cleveland, Tennessee. The fourth cover has Adams and Louisville post office markings with dates matching this cover (Aug. 21 and 22) and a 3c 1857 affixed over the Star Die; however, it is addressed to Kentucky and was accepted as prepaid by the receiving post office. This cover was handled by Adams within days of the August 26th termination date for all express intercourse between the North and South and also at the point when Northern post offices commenced demonetization of old stamps. The exchange period in Louisville began August 22nd for three days; beginning on August 25th, stamps other than the new 1861 Issue would no longer be accepted by the Louisville post office. The St. Paul office clearly refused to recognize a 3c 1857 on mail originating in the South, making this a remarkable "Southern Letter Unpaid" express usage.

Adams was required to pay Confederate postage, but letters never actually entered the mails at Nashville. Instead, the blue "Postage Paid" marking was used to indicate prepayment.



The New Orleans postmaster, J. L. Riddell, prepared provisional stamps in June 1861 and advertised them for sale on June 12th. The 2c Red stamps were printed without the marginal inscription "Usable exclusively in the New Orleans Post Office". The 5c and subsequent 2c Blue printings all have the imprint. It is the accepted theory that the 2c Red stamps were printed first, before Riddell added the imprint, and were withheld from use until January 1862 when the supply of 2c Blue stamps was exhausted. The Crown book lists six 2c Red covers, while Dr. Hubert C. Skinner (*The Congress Book*, 1978) recorded eight covers.



> Jobbery Sanders was appointed postmaster of Oakway, South Carolina, in 1858 and continued in 1861 when the Confederate government assumed control over the postal system. Oakway's population in 1861 was only 200, and the volume of mail was too small to justify a wood or metal cancelling device, so Postmaster Sanders simply postmarked mail by hand. His provisional stamps were probably short-lived and used on a very limited basis prior to the arrival of General Issue postage in November 1861.

> The Oakway provisional stamp was discovered as early as 1907, but only since 1975 has it received Scott Catalogue recognition. Research by the late Daniel T. Gilbert, who owned the other Oakway cover (dated Oct. 9, 1861, and ex Worthington), provided the historical evidence validating the provisional stamp. Soon after The Philatelic Foundation certified the Worthington-Gilbert cover as genuine, the September 18th ex-Ferrary cover was brought back to light by Raymond and Roger Weill, the renowned New Orleans dealers. The September 18th cover offered here has the "W.H.C." mark of Warren H. Colson, the preeminent dealer of the first half of the 20th century. The cover was in Colson's stock at the time of his death and was acquired by the Weills; however, its existence was not widely known until 1976.

> Mr. Gilbert established the validity of the Oakway provisional by travelling to South Carolina in 1974 and meeting J. B. Sanders, the postmaster's grandson, who was 95 at the time. Sanders immediately recognized his grandfather's writing and remembered him saying that he made up his own stamps before supplies of regular stamps arrived. Details of Gilbert's findings were published in the *Confederate Philatelist*, Sept.-Oct. 1975, and news of the second cover appeared in the Nov.-Dec. 1976 issue of the same publication.





Postmaster P. N. Booker was responsible for issuing the 2c, 5c and 10c provisional stamps at Uniontown, Alabama. One typeset form of four subjects was used for the three denominations. The numeral in parentheses between the "PA" and "ID" of "PAID" was changed for each value, and different color ink was used—Dark Blue (2c), Green (5c) and Red (10c). All three values were printed on gray blue paper—probably used for the first printing—and the 2c and 5c are also known on white paper, which was probably used for subsequent printings. The 10c has not been found on white paper.

Eight examples of the 10c Red are known to us. These are (in order of plate position): 1) Pos. 1 on cover to Maria L. Kidd, Port Royal Va., ex Kimmel, Haas, Birkinbine (the cover offered here); 2) Pos. 1 on cover to John D. Pitts, Richmond Va., ex Ferrary, Caspary and Isleham, 3) Pos. 2 on cover to Col. A. P. Calhoun, Pendleton S.C., illustrated in 1986 Dietz, p. 16, 4) Pos. 2 on cover to Maria Louisa Kidd, Port Royal Va., ex Meroni 5) Pos. 2 repaired stamp on repaired cover to Mrs. John B. Carey 6) Pos. 3, corner crease, small tear, on lady's embossed cover to Mr. Richmond Christian, Richmond Va., ex Hind, 7) Pos. 4 on cover to Col. A. P. Calhoun, Pendleton S.C., ex Sweet, Muzzy, and 8) Pos. 4 uncancelled on large piece with part of addressee's name "S. Price", Virginia destination, ex Caspary. The Scott Catalogue prices the 10c as an off-cover stamp, both unused and used, but we have not been successful in locating any off-cover examples other than the ex-Caspary piece.

Very few post offices *east of the Mississippi River* issued and used 10c adhesive (A) or press-printed (E) provisionals. This small group is as follows: Baton Rouge La. (A—three known); Charleston S.C. (E—unique, see lot 330); Danville Va. (E—probably not used); Fincastle Va. (E—unique); Fredericksburg Va. (A—never used); Greenville Ala. (A—three known); Greenwood Depot Va. (A—six known); Knoxville Tenn. (A—unique; and E—rare used); Marion Va. (A—six known on cover); Nashville Tenn. (A—seven known) on cover); Tellico Plains Tenn. (A—never used); and Uniontown Ala. (A—eight known). All other 10c provisionals were used in Texas or were issued as handstamped entires.

Not since our firm's sale of the A. Earl Weatherly collection in 1972 have the following essays (lots 486-489, 491-492) been made available at public auction. These remarkable essays were submitted by different printers in 1861 to Col. H. St. George Offutt, Chief of the Contract Bureau of the Post Office Department, in response to the department's solicitation for proposals to print Confederate government postage stamps. A detailed history of the selection process, as well as illustrations of these items, will be found in the 1929 Dietz book (pp. 3-7).

Col. Offutt retained the essays after the war, and they eventually came into the possession of August Dietz. After the Dietz collection was dispersed privately the essays were acquired by A. Earl Weatherly, whose important collection was sold at auction by our firm in October 1972. They passed from Jack E. Molesworth to Leonard Hartmann and then became part of the outstanding collection formed by the late Reverend Paul Freeland. The massive Freeland collection was acquired intact by Raymond and Roger Weill, who sold the essays to William F. Murphy, on whose behalf they are now offered.

These essays are of the utmost historical value as unique examples from the process that created the first stamps of the Confederate States.



The cover is accompanied by a letter from August Dietz, dated January 12, 1942, to a prior owner of the cover. In his letter Dietz provides his explanation for the imprint, which is that Cammann was a lithograph worker in the employ of Hoyer & Ludwig who added his name to the outside margin of the lithographic stone. Dietz further speculates that after the imprint was noticed, it was probably removed "on orders from the office".

Years after Dietz wrote his letter, research by Everett Cooper (published in *Confederate Philatelist*, Jan.-Feb. 1985) established that Cammann was indeed a lithograph worker, but Cooper connected the "Cammann" imprint to work performed for J. T. Paterson. It is known that the Paterson firm acquired some of Hoyer & Ludwig's equipment and employed a number of lithographers who had previously worked for Hoyer & Ludwig. The 5c Blue and 10c Rose lithographed stamps, which have always been attributed exclusively to Hoyer & Ludwig, could well have been printed by both Hoyer & Ludwig and J. T. Paterson, with the Hoyer & Ludwig imprint on the 10c stone left unchanged during the later Paterson printings. The addition of the "Cammann" imprint on 5c Blue and 10c Rose stamps tends to support Cooper's theory that a portion of the printing took place at the Paterson firm.







This cover is signed by Dietz and was part of the Storrow collection (acquired by Col. Green and sold as part of the Green estate). It was also part of the Robert Wiseman and Jack Solomon Confederate collections. Throughout this period of ownership it was always classified as a true Carmine. After the Solomon sale, the Philatelic Foundation rendered an opinion that the 10c stamp is the Rose Carmine shade (not Scott 5a, but a variation of Scott 5). We respectfully disagree with the P.F. on this color classification. A supply of Carmine stamps is known to have reached Knoxville, Tennessee, in July 1862, as evidenced by two of the indisputed Carmine color comes in a range of shades from a dull or dark Carmine to an intense shade with an almost wax-like impression. This variation resulted from inconsistent ink mixtures, but the Carmine can be distinguished from the Deep Rose and Rose Carmine shades of Scott 5 by its richness and heavy red saturation.

VERY FINE. ONE OF THE RAREST AND MOST SPECTACULAR OF CONFEDERATE GENERAL ISSUE PRINTING VARIETIES. ONLY A FEW EXAMPLES KNOWN.

We know of two vertical pairs containing one variety each, a horizontal pair (both the variety), and two singles, for a total of six examples. All six stamps originated from the same part of the sheet, which received a second lighter impression known as a "kiss print". This stamp was originally joined with the pair in the following lot (see illustration). It comes from our 1983 Rarities sale where it realized \$1,870. 1,500.00





Federal troops, which had occupied Baton Rouge since May 1862, evacuated the city on August 21, 1862. In their wake the Confederates maintained postal services on a restricted basis. In this instance, the rouletted stamps still on hand from the pre-May 1862 Confederate occupation were used on a letter (10c single rate) carried to Jackson, Mississippi, and posted there for Vernon. This usage during re-occupation is extremely rare, and no other examples cancelled at Jackson are known.

> It is believed that the postmasters in New Orleans and Baton Rouge (and possibly other waterway post offices) had an arrangement by which stamps of either office would be accepted on mail posted from river boats. In evidence of this practice is a cover to Berwick City, Louisiana, with the Baton Rouge postmaster's provisional stamp cancelled by the New Orleans double-circle river-boat datestamp dated January 31, 1862 (ex Caspary, see 1984 Rarities sale, lot 11). There are also examples of New Orleans provisionals cancelled at Baton Rouge and other offices along the Mississippi River (Grant sale).

Covers addressed to New Orleans with the first General Issue tied by the river-boat double-circle datestamp are scarce, but enough exist to show that mail was regularly received from river boats and processed wharfside. Unless the contents are present or the cover is docketed with sufficient information, it is impossible to pinpoint the origins of these inbound New Orleans river-mail covers. In this case, the use of a 5c General Issue with the unofficial *pierce en scie* roulette made at Baton Rouge leaves no doubt as to the origin. The cover was postmarked at the New Orleans wharf on April 18, 1862, the first day of bombardments by Federal naval forces against forts below New Orleans and just ten days before the city surrendered to Admiral Farragut. Baton Rouge fell on May 7th.

This is a significant cover, adding another dimension to the theory put forth by the late A. In this instance the sender was a Confederate relief organizer in the city of Fredericksburg, which was re-occupied by the Confederates after one of the bloodiest battles of the war. The battle raged for a day on December 13, 1862, and forced a Federal retreat across the Rappahannock River. Although technically a Confederate victory, the casualties were catastrophic for both sides—1,284 Federals killed, 1,769 missing, 9,600 wounded, and 595 Confederates killed, 653 missing, 4,061 wounded. Under the prevailing conditions in February 1863, extraordinary means to convey letters were required; in this case, the "Way" marking indicates that the letter was brought in by river boat. Although not a soldier's letter, it was accepted by the Richmond post office on the same basis and rated "Due 10" cents. A fascinating postal history usage......

A FINE AND VERY RARE COVER MAILED DURING THE CONFEDERATE OCCUPATION OF NEW MEXICO FROM THE NEWLY-FORMED TERRITORY OF ARIZONA.

In July 1861 Lt. Col. John Baylor raised the Confederate flag at Fort Bliss, later occupying Fort Fillmore and the town of Mesilla. On August 1st he issued a proclamation establishing the Confederate Territory of Arizona, naming Mesilla as its capital. In January 1862, at about the time this cover was postmarked, the Confederate Congress passed a bill establishing the Territory of Arizona. President Davis signed the bill in January and issued his presidential proclamation shortly thereafter.

During this period in which the Confederate Territory of Arizona was formed, Brigadier Henry Sibley raised three regiments, designated the Army of New Mexico, comprising the 4th, 5th and 7th Texas regiments. The 4th was known unofficially as the 1st Regiment of Sibley's Brigade, to which the sender of this letter, William Jones, belonged.





E. H. Cushing, publisher of the *Houston Daily Telegraph*, commenced his express service after New Orleans fell to the Federals in April 1862. In an effort to improve communications between Texan regiments in the East and their relations at home, as well as secure safe lines for news transmission, Cushing established routes with pony riders and other means of conveyance necessary to cross the Federal lines.

Cushing's agents affixed labels to the backs of envelopes carried by express. These were intended to inform patrons and advertise the service, thus were never meant to be cancelled. It is pure serendipity that the stamp was affixed and cancelled on the back of this cover, which resulted in the label being tied by the Mobile datestamp.



> Arthur H. Edey provided mail service between members of the 5th Regiment, Texas Volunteers, serving east of the Mississippi and their correspondents back home. This cover was probably carried across the river near Shreveport. New Salem, Texas, is in Rusk County, west of Shreveport and north of Liberty. One other cover from the Jessie Bryan correspondence is known; it is identically addressed and bears a block of four 10c Die A for the 40c government Trans-Mississippi express rate, cancelled by the army field office target. 

This cover is not listed in the Krieger book on Trans-Mississippi Express Mail, but a small number of covers to Capt. J. L. Kirby are recorded by Krieger, most of which are complete unpaid and presumably carried by courier. It cannot be said with certainty, but the words "Shreveport, La." and "Due 30" on this cover appear to be in a slightly different hand. Our analysis is that the cover was mailed from Richmond to Brandon with 10c regular postage and the expectation that a military courier would carry it by hand across the river for continued transmission to Capt. Kirby. Following this premise, the postal agent at Brandon added the Shreveport designation and "Due 30", treating the letter as a normal Trans-Mississippi Express cover (40c postage) but giving credit for the 10c stamp.



VERY FINE. ONE OF THREE RECORDED FRAMELINE COVERS HANDLED BY THE LOUISIANA RELIEF COMMITTEE AT MOBILE.

During the Federal occupation of New Orleans from May 1862 to the end of the war, there were many residents of the city who wished to continue corresponding with family and associates in the Confederate States. To circumvent the Federal post office, letters were smuggled out of New Orleans to Mobile where the Louisiana Relief Committee was situated. Provost Marshal J. C. Denis, a member of the committee and the officer responsible for official flag-of-truce mail through Mobile, endorsed at least some of the covers smuggled to and from New Orleans. In this case, the letter was probably sent to the care of Mr. DuBowe without a stamp, and he affixed the 10c Frameline for regular mail service to Uniontown, Alabama. Only two other Frameline covers handled by the Louisiana Relief Committee are known to us. One is similar to this cover, and the other was sold in our Apr. 9-10, 1997, auction (Sale 787); it is a flag-of-truce cover from a prisoner held in New Orlean, postmarked at Mobile on July 30, 1863. Unlike the prisoner-of-war cover, which was transported through official channels, the cover offered in this lot was contraband carried by hand (Mr. Comtin) across the lines, an act punishable by imprisonment if discovered by the Federals.

Although this cover has been sold on several occasions as a Frameline usage, its true identity is established here for the first time. An exciting discovery. E. 5,000-7,500



A REMARKABLE PAIR OF LETTERS. THE FIRST TELLS OF THE WRITER'S IMPENDING JOUR-NEY ON A BLOCKADE RUNNER, WHILE THE SECOND IS AN EXTREMELY RARE FLAG-OF-TRUCE USAGE FROM CUBA TO SOUTH CAROLINA VIA NEW YORK CITY, FORTRESS MONROE AND RICHMOND, VIRGINIA.

The first is datelined Wilmington N.C. Oct. 7, 1863, as Aichel is awaiting his departure on board the "Blockade Runner. . . Margaretha & Jessie" to be transported to Nassau and Havana, with 10c Green, Die B (12) tied by "Wilmington N.C." circular datestamp.

The second, headed "Fourth letter", is datelined "Habana, 22 Decemb. 1863" and written in English for the purpose of censoring. Aichel mentions he has been in Havana for $1\frac{1}{2}$ months, describes the difficulty of finding work at reasonable wages and characterizes locals as "those mis-trusting vicious creoles." He closes by wishing his family a Merry Christmas. This letter is endorsed "By Flag of Truce" and was enclosed in an outer envelope (no longer present), which carried it by steamer to New York City and from there to the exchange point at Fortress Monroe in Virginia. The enclosed letter was censored and marked "Examined J. Cassels" (John Cassels, Captain and Provost Marshal), then sent by flag-of-truce boat to Richmond, where 10c Greenish Blue, Die B (12), large margins, was tied by "Richmond Va. Jan. 18" (1864) circular datestamp.

Both are in Very Fine condition. Letters originating outside the continental United States and carried into the Confederacy under the flag of truce are extremely rare—far rarer, in fact, than blockade-run covers into Confederate ports. Two similiar covers from the Aichel correspondence—one with a faulty stamp, the other stampless—were offered in our sale of the Kohn collection (Sale 382). E. 7,500-10,000



FINE AND VERY RARE—POSSIBLY UNIQUE—CIVILIAN FLAG-OF-TRUCE COVER WITH THE 10-CENT ROSE LITHOGRAPH.

It is not clear to us how this flag-of-truce cover was handled. The regulations required the use of two envelopes for flag-of-truce mail. Ordinarily, on a South-to-North letter, the outer envelope would bear Confederate postage and an appropriately worded "Flag of Truce" address. At the exchange point the inner envelope bearing U.S. postage would be removed and put into the Federal mails. In this instance, it appears that the envelope bearing Confederate postage (the 10c Rose) was examined by the Confederate censor (ms. "Exd") and placed into the mails, receiving a Federal "Due 3" handstamp. While the regulations were often breached by placing Confederate and U.S. stamps on one envelope, this usage—without any Federal postmark other than the "Due 3"—is enigmatic and obviously extremely rare, if not unique. Cover with full endorsement and addressed to his father at Camden S.C., 3c Rose (65) tied by grid, "Delaware City Del. Aug. 24" cds, oval examiner's handstamp, "Richmond Va. Sep. 6" cds and "10" C.S.A. rate handstamp, fresh and Very Fine.

As the writer (and member of the group) states so succinctly, the "600" was a group of 600 prisoners, all Confederate officers, moved to Morris Island in Charleston harbor in August 1864 and held in open barracks exposed to mortar fire from Confederate batteries. This extraordinarily inhumane act was the Federal response to an equally repulsive act on the part of Confederates in Charleston, who exposed Union prisoners to bombardment from Federal forces within range of the city. This sorry chapter of the war ended in a stalemate in October 1864. Covers from Confederate prisoners en route to and from or imprisoned on Morris Island are very rare—this example from the Johnson correspondence is especially noteworthy for its historical content. Although postal markings and dates are used to identify prisoners' mail from the Confederate "600" (and their Union counterparts), this letter containing an explicit description of the prisoner's fate is outstanding.

A VERY FINE AND IMPORTANT HISTORICAL COVER, CARRIED BY STEAMBOAT INTO NEW ORLEANS AT THE CLIMAX OF THE BATTLE OF NEW ORLEANS.

April 24th marked the climax of the Battle of New Orleans in which Federal gunboats under Admiral Farragut's command effectively defeated Confederate defending forces. The refusal of Mayor John Monroe and Confederate Gen. Mansfield Lovell to formally surrender, coupled with Lovell's decision to withdraw his troops, resulted in days of military skirmishing and widespread chaos as citizens of the undefended city panicked. On April 25th Farragut's forces anchored off the New Orleans waterfront watched as the wharf was set afire by the city's own residents—a young girl wrote in her diary "We are conquered but not subdued." (*The Civil War: Day by Day*, p. 204).

On May 1st Maj. General Benjamin F. Butler began his command and administration of New Orleans. Butler's harsh command earned him the sobriquet "Beast" Butler. After April 24th there was no regular Confederate postal activity in New Orleans, which effectively makes this a last day cover of the most important port city's post office in the Confederacy. During Federal occupation letters were smuggled between residents of New Orleans and relations in the Confederate States.

A FINE AND REMARKABLE COVER. POSTMARKED IN RICHMOND SEVEN DAYS PRIOR TO THE UNION ARMY'S OCCUPATION OF RICHMOND AND DELIVERED ON MAY 9, 1865, BY THE FEDERAL POST OFFICE.

On Sunday, April 2, 1865, the Confederate government evacuated Richmond. Looting and fires borke out throughout the Confederate capital as the Federal army approached. The following day the Union army's Maj. Gen. Godfrey Weitzel restored order to the city and prepared for the arrival of President Lincoln on the next day. In *A Chautauqua Boy*, the war memoirs of David B. Parker, who served as Superintendent of the Mails of the Army of the Potomac, he states "...[after occupation] I conducted the post-office at Richmond for a number of weeks. ..Dr. Alex. Sharp, whose wife was a sister of Mrs. grant, was soon appointed postmaster, and I remained at Richmond and had my office with him."

This cover is unusual in two respects. It is addressed to a judge in Richmond, yet has 20c postage cancelled at Richmond on March 27th. There are other so-called overpaid drop letters, which are really letters brought from outside the city and postmarked in Richmond, which is what we think occured in this instance. Our theory regarding the lapse of time between the postmark and receipt dates is that the letter was pigeon-holed at the Richmond post office, waiting to be picked up by Judge Moncave. When the post office shut down on April 2nd, the letter remained in the post office and was not made available until the Federals re-organized postal service. We know of no other cover that entered the post office under the Confederates and exited under the Federals.
