## Provisional Issues of North Carolina Confederate Mail 1861 – 1865

On May 20, 1861, North Carolina began a period of history that the likes of which have never been seen before or since. Throughout these roughest periods of time, one aspect of human needs were met; the written communications by government and private mails continued.

When the Confederate post office began operation on June 1, 1861, it was ill prepared to provide stamps to postmasters. The department authorized postmasters to revert back to the use of stampless markings to indicate the payment of postage. When the need arose for the prepayment of postage, 150 Confederate postmasters produced provisional stamps and covers to service this need. To date, 19 North Carolina cities have been identified as having 29 different varieties of provisional. This exhibit contains 18 of these cities and 26 of the known varieties. On occasion, even after Confederate stamps were issued, postmasters would run out of their supply of stamps and revert back to issuing provisional stamps and covers.

This exhibit deals with the three types of provisionals issued in the Confederacy:

- Adhesive postage stamps Printed or hand stamped on paper for separate attachment to envelopes. Three North Carolina towns issued such.
- Press printed envelopes Produced in quantity and provided by the printer to the postmaster. Three North Carolina towns issued such.
- Hand stamp provisional envelopes Prepared in advance of use; in most cases sold by the postmaster and carried home for later use. Fifteen North Carolina towns issued such.

Provided in the following frames are 30 examples of North Carolina provisionals covering all three types of known markings. Information known about the marking, the statistics of the issues, quantities known of specific items, as well as significant past ownership is included. By philatelic standards, all Confederate provisionals are scarce. The most common North Carolina provisional is Raleigh with less than 200 known. Many are unique with only one example recorded. Several examples shown here are the only known.

A few exceptional items that should be noted for special attention are:

Page 3 – Charlotte, the discovery copies and only examples known; page 3 – Gaston, Dietz discovery copy and only known example; page 6 – Greensboro, only known CSA provisional revalued to a due; page 7 – Lenoir, one of only two known examples used on college covers; page 10 – newly discovered Mount Pleasant provisional; page 14 – the only recorded press printed Salisbury provisional; page 16 – Wilksboro, Dietz discovery copy and only known example.

The condition of Confederate covers is always a problem to collectors. In fact, they reflect the condition of the time. A number of the covers on display have had varying degrees of professional restoration in order to save them from further decay, but none affect either marks or stamps.

#### Lenoir, NC, September 21 (1861)

5 cent blue, Type 1 adhesive, ruled line paper. 25 mm blue, Type 2 CDS.

This provisional was hand engraved on pear wood by G.W.F. Harper, son of Postmaster Harper. The stamp was press printed on white wove cross-ruled paper. About 500 stamps were printed and sold.



## Statesville, NC, June 30, (1863) 5 cent, Black, Type Ab paid 5 revalued handstamp 10 On July 1, 1862, the postage rate for less than 500 miles was increased from 5 cents to 10 cents



### Wilkesboro, NC, November 8, (1861)

10 cent Black, revalued 14 mm circle 5 overstruck by 21 mm circle Paid/10 The paid was struck within an undated Wilkesboro CDS as the control mark for a 5 cent rate cover. The cover was posted November 8 to Arkansas, a distance over 500 miles, thus the need for the 10 cent rate.
