Rebel Archives New Discoveries: Jefferson Davis Covers and Dupree's Old Store

Introduction

While reviewing just one microfilm reel of the online Rebel archives for covers, I soon realized two things. All the covers had been removed or, if it was a folded letter, had not been scanned. There were no covers with Confederate stamps. However, after reviewing an additional three reels of documents, I found two addressed to Jefferson Davis.

New Listing





Figure 1. New listing for Duprees Old Store (Virginia), "Paid 5."

The first one, a new listing, was from Duprees Old Store (Virginia) with a manuscript "Paid 5" marking (Figure 1).¹ The 5¢ was the postage rate for a letter sent less than 500 miles. The *Confederate States of America Catalog and Handbook* had just one listing for Dupree's Old Store – an 1862 manuscript "Paid / 2." Note the catalog spells Duprees as Dupree's (the proper name of the town).² I use both variations where appropriate.

This letter, with a dateline of Nov. 1, 1861, was sent to Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederate States. Thomas J. Morris applied for the discharge of his son, Macon C. Morris, who was in the Keysville Company 23rd Regiment Virginia Volunteers. He wrote that his son was 17 on Aug. 8, had a bad cough and could not sleep at nights. The cold winter weather made the symptoms worse. The letter was received by the Adjutant General's Office Nov. 6, 1861. I could not find his reply to this letter.

Robert Lisbeth's *Virginia Postal Markings and Postmasters*, *Colonial – 1865* has a July 24, 1862, tracing where the "S" in "store" is lower case (Figure 2).³

Short History of the Dupree's Old Store Post Office

William Dupree Sr. (also spelled Deupree in Ancestry.com), born on July 7, 1759, in Lunenburg, Va., married Amey Pettus; they became the parents of seven sons and seven daughters. He died June 16, 1854, in Charlotte, Va., at the age of 94. Figure 3 shows pictures of his house and old store.4




Figure 4. Portion of David Burr's 1839 Post Route Map with Postal Route 2481 in red.

The red line on Burr's *Post Route Map* shows Postal Route 2481 (Figure 4).⁵ The 67-mile route went from Nottaway Court House (upper right), through Jeffries Store, Laurel Hill, Double Bridge, Haleysburg, Dupree's Old Store, Wylliesburg, Bentleyville and, finally, to Scottsburg and the Halifax Court House (lower left). A.A. Jetter was the mail contractor awarded the weekly route from Jan. 1, 1849 - June 30 1851, at an annual rate of \$375.⁶

The Dupree's Old Store Post Office was established Sept. 6, 1837, with Thomas L. Morris as its first postmaster. It was located one mile west of Blue Stone Creek, the nearest other post office being Wylliesburg,

four miles to the southwest. Figure 5 shows the current Google Map with Deuprees Store Road. The red oval is my estimation of where the Old Store was located. Blue Stone Creek is on the right side of the King's Highway. Postmaster compensation for this post office is seen in Table 1. Morris' compensation was paid according to the amount of postage he collected and dropped in 1845 because of the reduction in letter rates. For example, in 1839, the postage on a letter mailed between 150 to 400 miles was $18\frac{4}{4}$, which in 1845, dropped to 10^{4} – a 46% decrease. In 1851 the rate dropped further to 3^{4} . The table shows Morris' 1845 compensation dropped more than \$20, and the net proceeds to the Post Office Department dropped more than \$35.⁷

Dupree's Old Store Post Office closed Feb. 16, 1881. It reopened May 31, 1881, under the new name of Dupree Post Office and closed July 31, 1918, with mail going to Finneywood.

Another New Listing

While researching Don Tocher's website, I discovered a Duprees Old Store "Paid 10¢" (Figure 6)⁸. The letter is datelined Nov. 9, 1861. The 10¢ rate

Second Jefferson Davis Cover Found in Rebel Archives

Mr. G.W. Gilmore wrote to His Excellency Jeff Davis, President of the Confederate States, from Copiah County, Miss. on July 20, 1864. He recommended Rev. George J. Mortimer, who was well known in Copiah County and the surrounding counties, as Purchasing Agent (Figure 7).⁹

This letter shows no postal markings and was probably submitted in a bulk envelope sent by Ethelbert Barksdale to the Secretary of War in Richmond from 1861-65. During the Civil War, he

represented Mississippi as a member of the Confederate States Congress.
